## Terry Allebaugh Testifies before the United States Senate

On Tuesday, May 8, Housing for New Hope executive director Terry Allebaugh was in Washington, D.C., to testify before the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions. He was accompanied by program director and alumnus Alphonso Williams.

Invited by Senator Richard Burr to speak at the committee hearing, "Transforming Mental Health and Substance Abuse Systems of Care: Community Integration and Recovery," Mr. Allebaugh testified to support the authorization of \$80 million in federal money to fund a new bill called the Services for Ending Long-Term Homelessness Act.

Mr. Allebaugh told the committee, "Piecemeal services, congregate shelters, and spare change do not lead to transformative systems of care. Homeless people. . . need real services that are comprehensive. . . They need real change, not spare change."

## PATH Expands to Serve Orange County Homeless

In April, Housing for New Hope began offering its outreach services to homeless individuals in Orange County.

Supported by the Orange Person Chatham Area Program (OPC) and working in partnership with the Inter-Faith Council for Social Service (IFC), Housing for New Hope's PATH outreach team has expanded to replicate the successful work that it has been doing in Durham County for the past three years.

Housing for New Hope welcomes new staff members Julie Ransford and Michael Kelly (a recent Phoenix House graduate), who will be responsible for its outreach work in Orange County.

Housing for New Hope thanks IFC for in-kind office space and support infrastructure. IFC is also setting aside seven beds in its HomeStart and Community House facilities for PATH clients.

"It is a great addition for our community," said IFC executive director Chris Moran.

OPC community planner Vanessa Neustrom said, "We are excited to have Housing for New Hope focus its efforts on homeless individuals in Orange County."
